
# **Tickets for the Saint Louis Symphony Concert**

Schifrin's music is a synthesis of traditional and twentieth-century techniques, and his early love for jazz and rhythm are strong attributes of his style.

He has written more than 100 scores for films and television, including "Mission Impossible," "Mannix," "Cool Hand Luke," and "Dirty Harry." Lalo Schifrin has won four Grammy Awards (with twenty nominations), one Cable ACE Award, and received six Oscar nominations. In addition to current commissions and film scoring activities, Schifrin does extensive touring conducting symphony orchestras, particularly featuring his jazz repertoire.

AMTA is proud to present Schifrin's latest work, Jazz and Blues Variations, A Symphonic Celebration, premiered by the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra and commissioned specially for the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Music Therapy in America by AMTA and the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra.

# Concert Program

### Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra

Founded in 1880, the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra (SLSO) is recognized internationally as an ensemble of the highest caliber, performing a broad musical repertoire with skill and spirit. Under the direction of acclaimed Dutch conductor Hans Vonk, now in his fifth year as Music Director and Conductor, the SLSO continues to build upon its reputation for musical excellence, while also maintaining its commitment to ground-breaking community partnership and music education projects that have been hailed as national models.

A familiar presence in broadcast and recording media, the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra continues to attract new listeners across the United States through weekly broadcasts on National Public Radio. Recordings by the SLSO have met with critical acclaim and have been honored with six Grammy Awards and fifty-six Grammy nominations.

A national leader in the field of music education, the SLSO has made a firm commitment to providing the highest quality instruction to students of all ages and abilities. The boldest step forward in this regard was the establishment of the Saint Louis Symphony Music School, which opened in September 1994 via a merger with the St. Louis Conservatory and Schools for the Arts (CASA). Now in its seventh year, the Symphony Music School currently has an enrollment of 4,000 students and offers classes and performance opportunities at eight locations throughout the greater St. Louis area.

The Saint Louis Symphony also participates in the E. Desmond Lee Music Education Collaborative, a partnership between the SLSO, the University of Missouri—St. Louis, Opera Theatre of Saint Louis, and fifty schools selected by eleven St. Louis-area school districts. Based on a 1996 pilot program that was originally funded by the Whitaker Foundation, the Collaborative enhances the music curricula of member schools through various initiatives, including classroom interaction, faculty, and artists from the participating institutions.

#### Rachel Barton

Violinist

The 24-year-old American violinist Rachel Barton is widely recognized as one of the most gifted virtuosi of her generation. She has appeared as soloist with



many prestigious ensembles, including the Chicago Symphony, the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra, the Dallas Symphony, the Montreal Symphony, the Vienna Symphony, the Belgian National Orchestra and the Budapest Symphony.


A native of Chicago, she began violin studies at age 3, made her professional debut four years later with the Chicago String Ensemble and gave her earliest performances with the Chicago Symphony at ages 10 and 15 for public television. She makes time in her schedule for chamber music and her performances have been broadcast on National Public Radio's "Performance Today" on numerous occasions.

Miss Barton is on the board of directors of the Music Institute of Chicago. Alongside her touring activities, she enjoys giving special programs and demonstrations for children. Her efforts to reach younger audiences have also included frequent interviews/performances on rock music radio stations.

#### **David Amado**

Associate Conductor, Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra Ann Whitney Olin Chair

David Amado is the Associate Conductor of the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra (SLSO) and Music Director and Conductor of



the Saint Louis Symphony Youth Orchestra. His association with the SLSO began in 1997, when he was appointed to the post of Webster University–Saint Louis Symphony Conducting Assistant. He was subsequently named Assistant Conductor and was advanced to his current appointment at the end of the 1999-2000 season. Until recently, he also served as Managing Director and Conductor of Sequitur, a New York-based contemporary music ensemble, of which he was a cofounder as well.

Prior to his St. Louis appointments, Mr. Amado held the post of Conducting Apprentice with the Oregon Symphony. He has also served as Resident Conductor at the Garth Newel Music Center in Warm Springs, Virginia, as Conductor of the Juilliard Chamber Opera, as Assistant Conductor of the Juilliard Opera Theater, and as Conductor of the Norwalk (Connecticut) Youth Symphony's Concert Orchestra.



#### The William W. Sears Memorial Fund

The William W. Sears Memorial Fund was established in memory of a National Association for Music Therapy leader whose membership dated back to the association's formative years in the early 1950's.

William Sears first joined NAMT in 1951, one year after its founding, and maintained that affiliation until his death in December of 1980. He served as president (1971-1973), was the first editor of the *Journal of Music Therapy* (1964-1968), and held numerous other elective and appointive posts. In 1975 he designed the organizational plan from which the NAMT constitution was crafted.

Chief among his contributions to the music therapy profession was his authorship of the chapter "Process in Music Therapy" in the book *Music in Therapy*, which was edited by E. Thayer Gaston.

Dr. Sears was a teacher for over 27 years, during which time he directed music therapy programs at the University of Kansas, Indiana University, and Ohio University. His alma mater was the University of Kansas where he earned the baccalaureate, masters and doctorate degrees. He spent his life in service to the National Association for Music Therapy, the music therapy profession, and the community at large in a variety of positions.

The mission of the William W. Sears Memorial Fund is to advance the knowledge of music as therapy by exploring music's relationship to and influence upon reality, employing a communicative format that will reach a broad audience and will maximize benefit to music therapists. The William W. Sears Distinguished Lecturer Series was designed to fulfill the Fund's mission.

Administered by the American Music Therapy Association, the Fund exists solely through the generous financial contributions of individuals and groups both inside and outside the Association. # 2000 Distinguished Sears Lecture Series

# History, Celebrations, And The Transmission Of Hope The American Music Therapy Association, 1950–2000

merican music therapists have a long and distinguished history, and historical research has been gaining attention in recent years. Recent research on significant people, places, and ideas in music therapy suggests the possibility of interesting new developments. Who cares about music therapy history? What difference does it make? Why do music therapists celebrate on the occasion of the profession's fiftieth anniversary? Professor Heller addresses these and related questions. He assays what history is, why celebrations are important, and how history contributes to understanding the present and preparing for the future. Heller shows how historical research and writing can result in the transmission of hope from one generation to another. He talks about why

memory (as opposed to nostalgia, amnesia, and presentism) is such an important human faculty. Part of the presentation addresses topics for which research is most needed and how historians might begin to investigate them. Heller explains the importance of history to the profession here and now, and why historical research will be even more important to music therapists in the future.

George N. Heller holds music degrees from the University of Michigan. He has taught in Michigan schools and performed with U. S. Army Bands in Illinois and Germany. Dr. Heller joined the faculty at the University of Kansas in 1973. He was founding editor of The Bulletin of Historical Research in Music Education and Music Education area advisor for The New Grove Dictionary of American Music and has published extensively on music education and music therapy history.

### The William W. Sears Distinguished Lecturer Series

Sponsorship and funding for the William W. Scars Distinguished Lecturer Series is shared jointly by the American Music Therapy Association and the William W. Sears Memorial Fund. Inaugurated in 1984, the Lecturer Series has presented a distinguished speaker at ten national music therapy conferences.

Lecturers are leading scholars drawn from fields related to music therapy which consumed Dr. Sears' interest throughout his life. These fields include, although not limited to, semantics, creativity, learning theory, physics, philosophy, brain and physiological research, existentialism, and holistic and paranormal psychology.

The universality of music and its potent influence speak to many disciplines, and only through a greater understanding and awareness of the place music holds in the grand scheme of things will humankind begin to gain a glimpse of its power and meaning. The insatiable quest for knowledge about their art is central to music therapists. It is the Fund's mission through the Distinguished Lecturer Series to assist AMTA members in this quest.

he AMTA Continuing Education Committee would like to clarify some of the continuing education options available at this conference.

Participants may earn five CMTE credits for attending this conference. CMTE credit is offered for attendance at AMTA conferences, as AMTA is a pre-approved provider of Continuing Music Therapy Education activities. CBMT guidelines state that an individual may earn five of these type of CMTE credits per conference with a maximum of fifteen CMTE credits per five year cycle.

Twenty-one intensive workshops and four institutes are being offered at this year's conference which are pre-approved by CBMT. Registrants will receive a certificate indicating completion of this learning experience. According to CBMT guidelines, members choosing this option will need only their certificate for documentation; no summary is required. It is mandatory that you be on time and stay for the entire length of the course or institute for credit.

Umbrella groupings may be combined using some of the workshops at this conference. Eligibility for this type of educational activity requires documentation from the participant. Umbrella groupings must be completed within a 12 month period. These are not pre-approved activities.

Short event activities are any sessions at this conference which are fewer than five (5) contact hours of learning activity. In this category, up to 15 CMTE credits per five-year recertification cycle will be allowed by CBMT. Documentation is a certificate or other proof of attendance at the event. It is up to the individuals to monitor their limit. These are not pre-approved activities.
